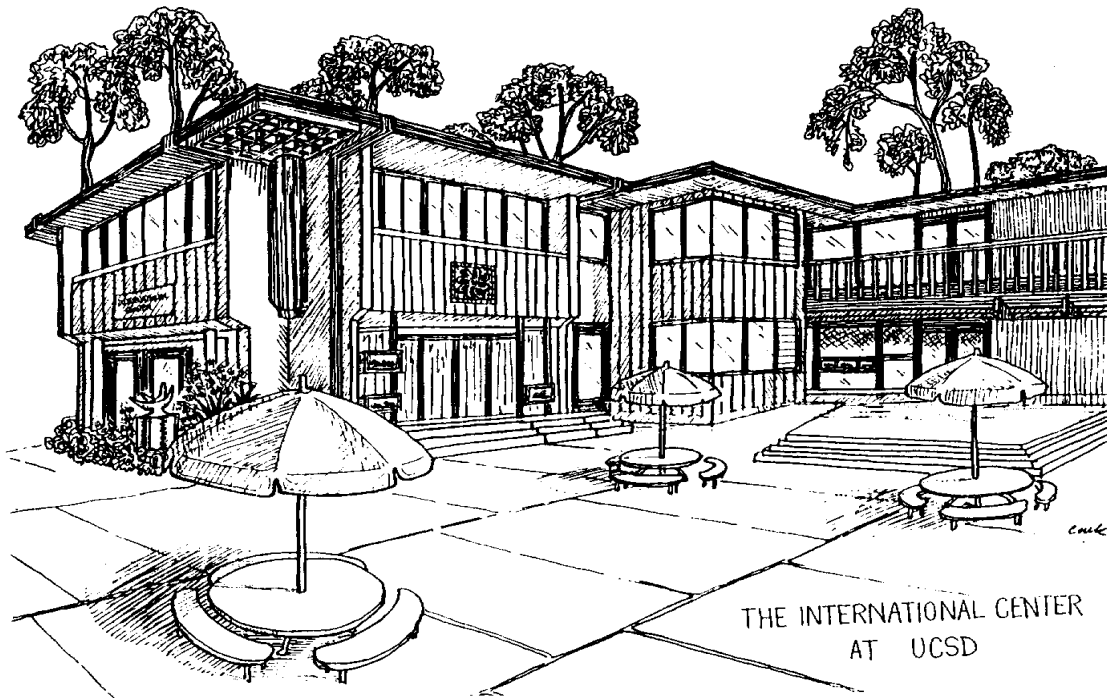

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2002-2003 INTERNATIONAL CENTER HIGHLIGHTS

PROGRAMS ABROAD

- **UCSD sent 911 students abroad during 2002-2003**, maintaining a lead among UC campuses. Participation is approaching 1,000 UCSD students abroad for the current 2003-04 academic year.
- **Engineering majors abroad increased by 55%**. Programs abroad participants, who are majoring in Engineering increased from 47 students during 2001-02 to 73 students during 2002-03.
- The total number of **UCSD students** abroad decreased for the first time since 1992, due to **safety/security concerns, combined with declines in both the economy and the value of the U.S. dollar**.
- **UCSD students were awarded \$410,900 in study abroad scholarships** during 2002-2003.
- A part-time **Peace Corps Recruiter** joined the staff of the **Programs Abroad Office**, funded by an annual contract developed in collaboration with the **United States Peace Corps**.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS AND SCHOLARS

- A total of **4,619 nonimmigrant international students and scholars** were hosted by UCSD during 2002-03.
1,607 degree students **1,824 international "scholars"** **1,188** at University **Extension**
- **International students at UCSD increased in number from 1,264 to 1,607 during 2002-03**, despite declines experienced by many other campuses.
- **The largest percentage of UCSD international students are from Asia (66%)**, followed by **19% from Europe**.
- **UCSD is ranked 6th among U.S. research institutions, based on our international scholar population of 1,824**. (International "scholars" are academic researchers and faculty.)
- **43% of UCSD international scholars are from Asia**, followed by **41% from Europe**.

FRIENDS OF THE INTERNATIONAL CENTER, VOLUNTEER SUPPORT, AND DONATIONS

- **Community groups, including Friends of the International Center, contributed \$42,695 to UCSD**. Additionally, **community groups, sponsoring weekly International Cafés, contributed \$6,555**.
- **Active volunteers at the International Center numbered 1,150**. **Volunteers contributed over 42,229 person-hours** of time to UCSD.
Examples of the number of "person hours" volunteered at the International Center during 2002-03:
 - **English Language Tutors** volunteered **17,600 hours**.
 - **Host Families** volunteered **7,600 hours** to provide short-term hospitality to new international arrivals.
 - **Weekly Coffee Hour volunteers** donated **3,450 hours** of hospitality hosting spouses and children.
 - **Friends Resale Shop volunteers** donated **3,600 hours** and **raised \$15,573** for scholarships.
 - **Friends Board Members** volunteered a minimum of **3,539 hours**.

INTERNATIONAL CENTER FACILITY AND ACTIVITIES

- Over **1,045 events** were held at the **International Center**. **Primary users were student organizations**.
- **6,709** students, scholars and community members attended weekly **International Café lunches** at the Center.

UCSD's INTERNATIONAL HOUSE

- A spectacular new **UCSD International House residential facility opened Fall 2003**. It is located on the North Campus on Eleanor Roosevelt College's campus. Capacity increased from **150 to 265 residents**.
- UCSD's **International House is open to students from all colleges**. It also now has an **appointed Faculty Fellow** and includes **five apartments** to house five to seven **international research scholars**.

- To facilitate re-entry of study abroad returnees, ensuring personal reintegration and maximum sharing of their international education experiences with the UCSD community.
- To support growth and development of UCSD International House, in order to increase on campus intercultural exchange and understanding between international and U.S. students and scholars, including both residents and non-residents.

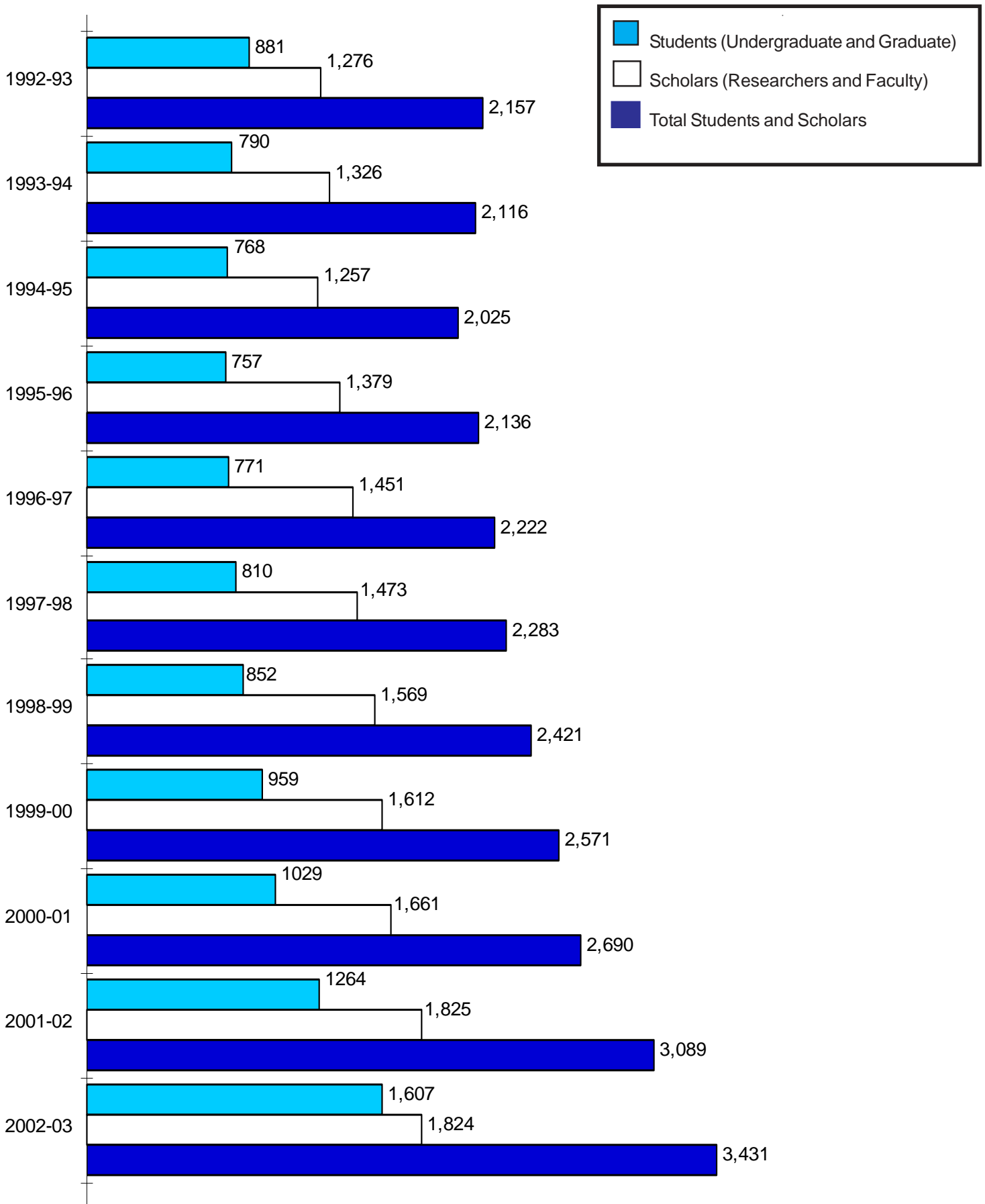
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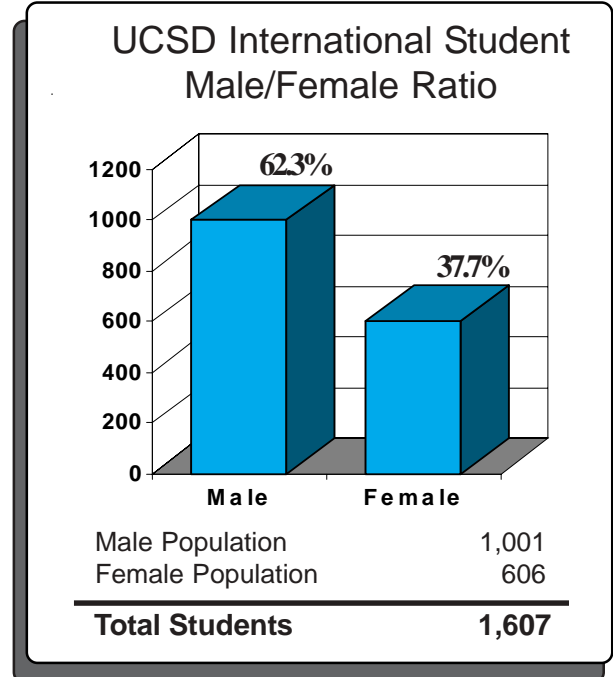
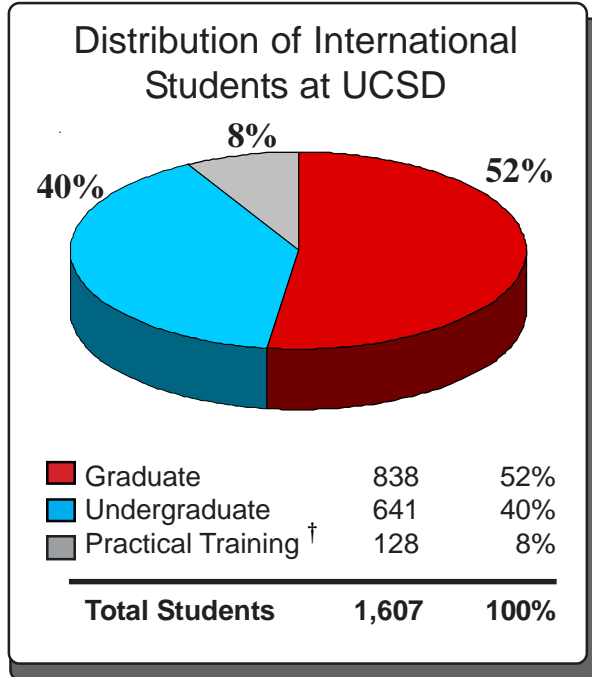
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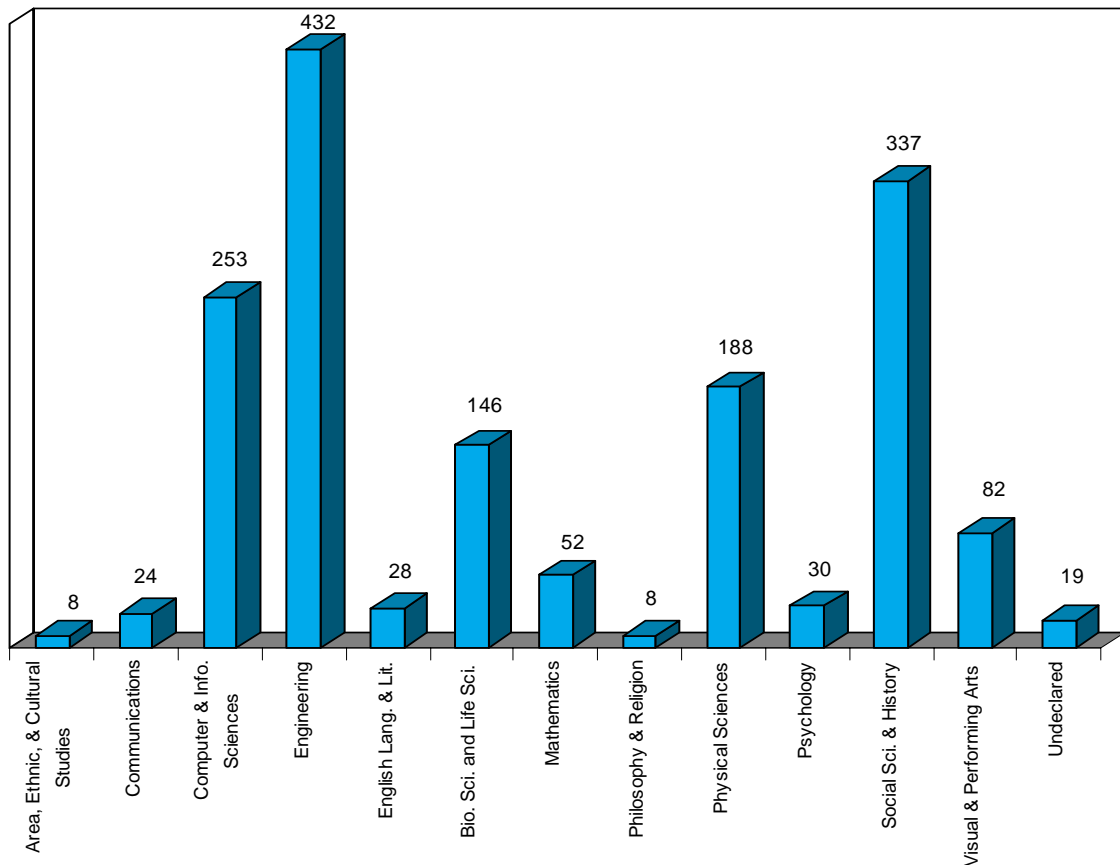
International Population Served by the UCSD International Center

Distribution of International Students at UCSD by Academic Area (categories set by the Institute of International Education)

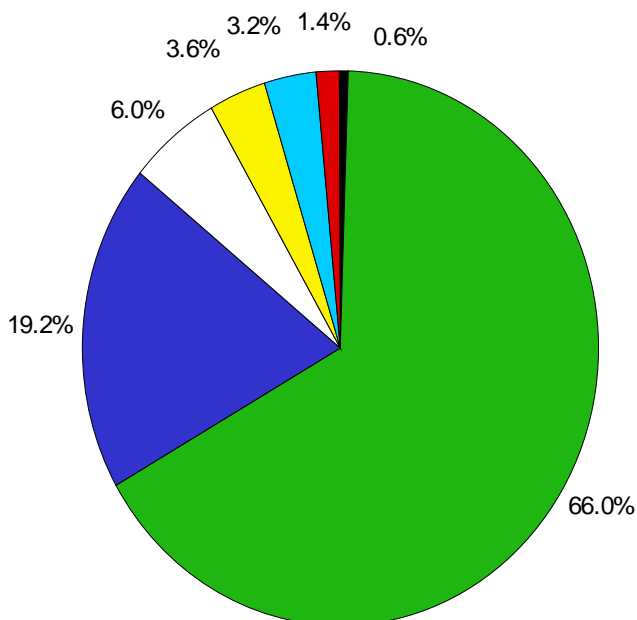

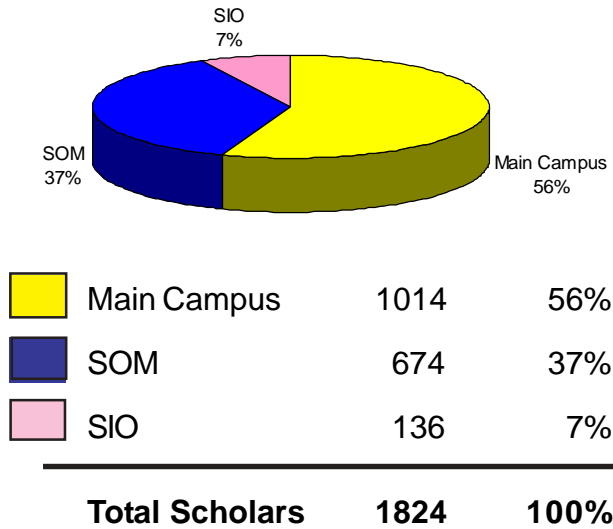

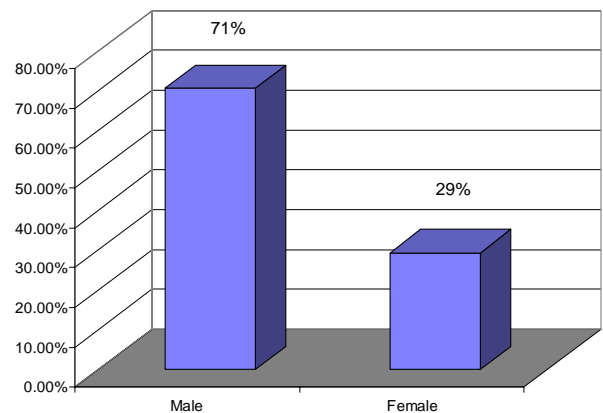

UCSD International Scholars Male / Female Ratio

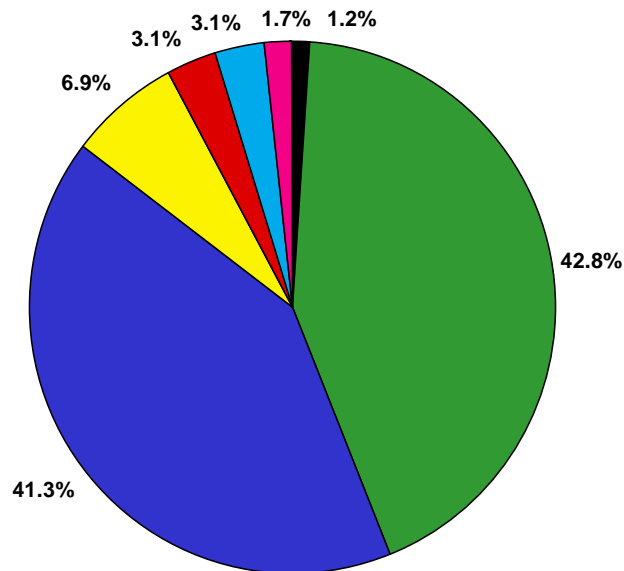

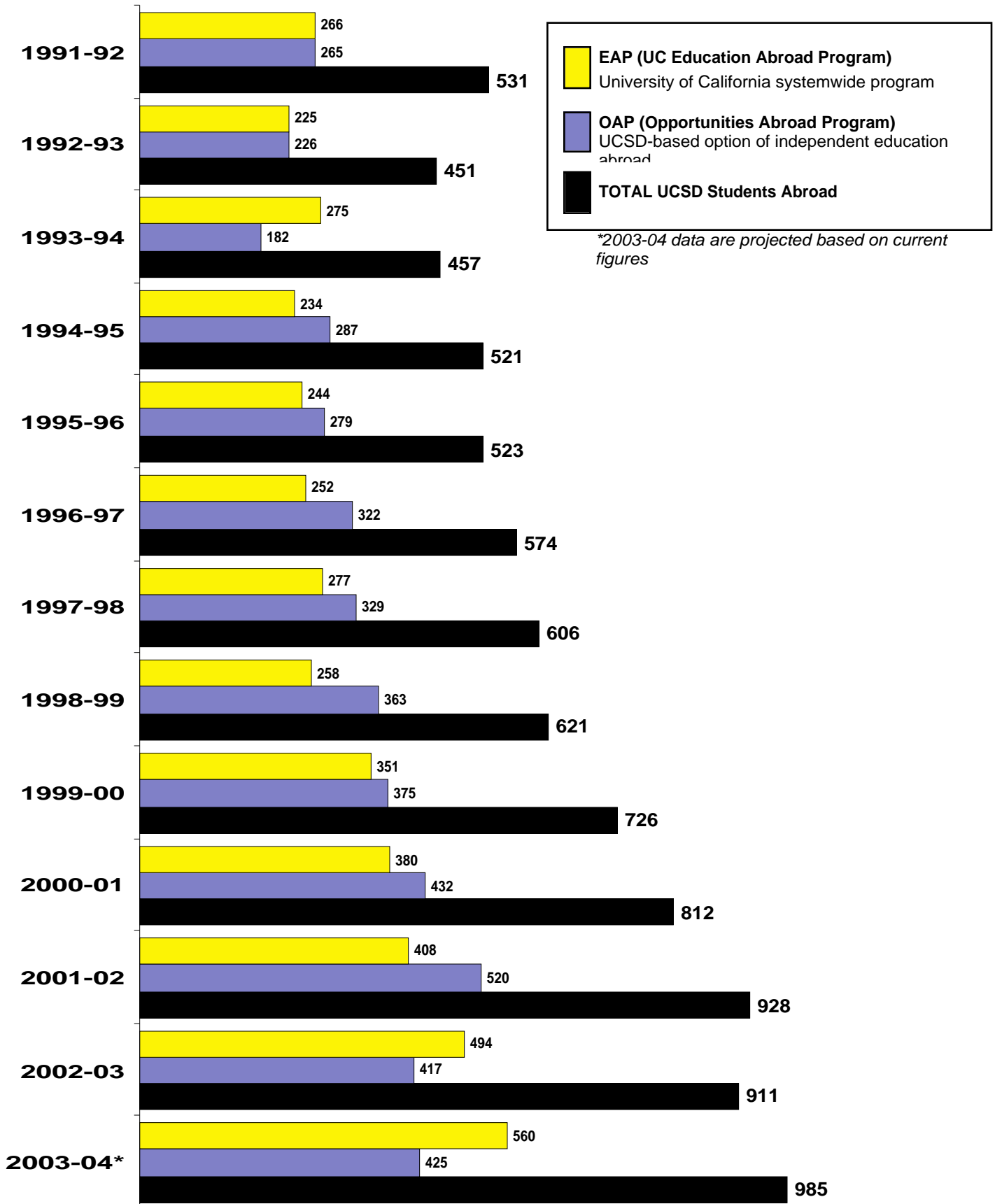

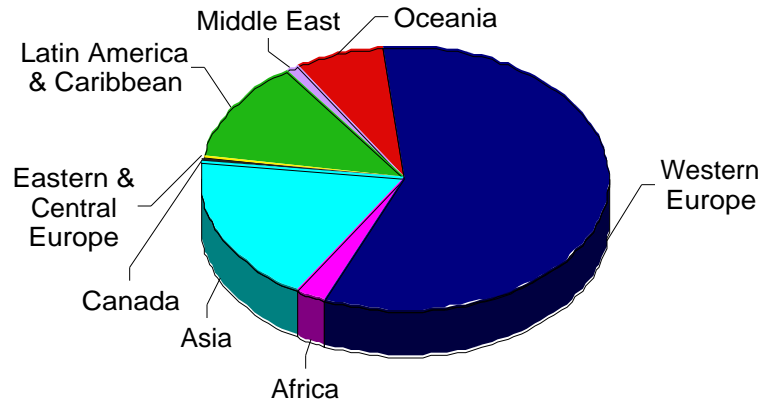
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Growth of UCSD Programs Abroad Participation from 1991 to 2004



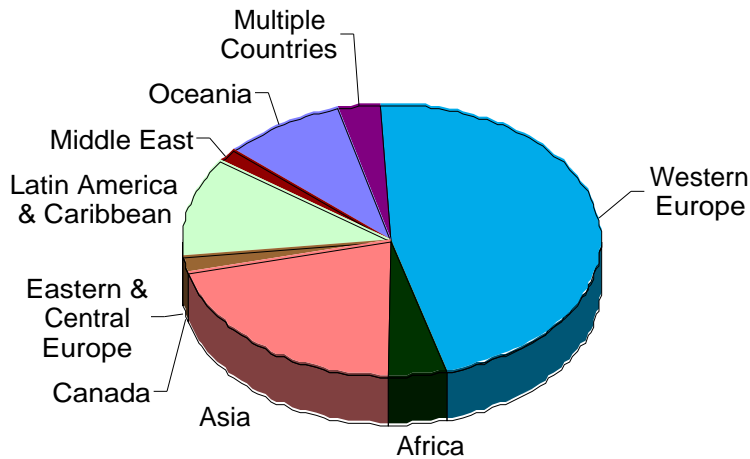
UCSD Study Abroad Participation by World Area 2002-03

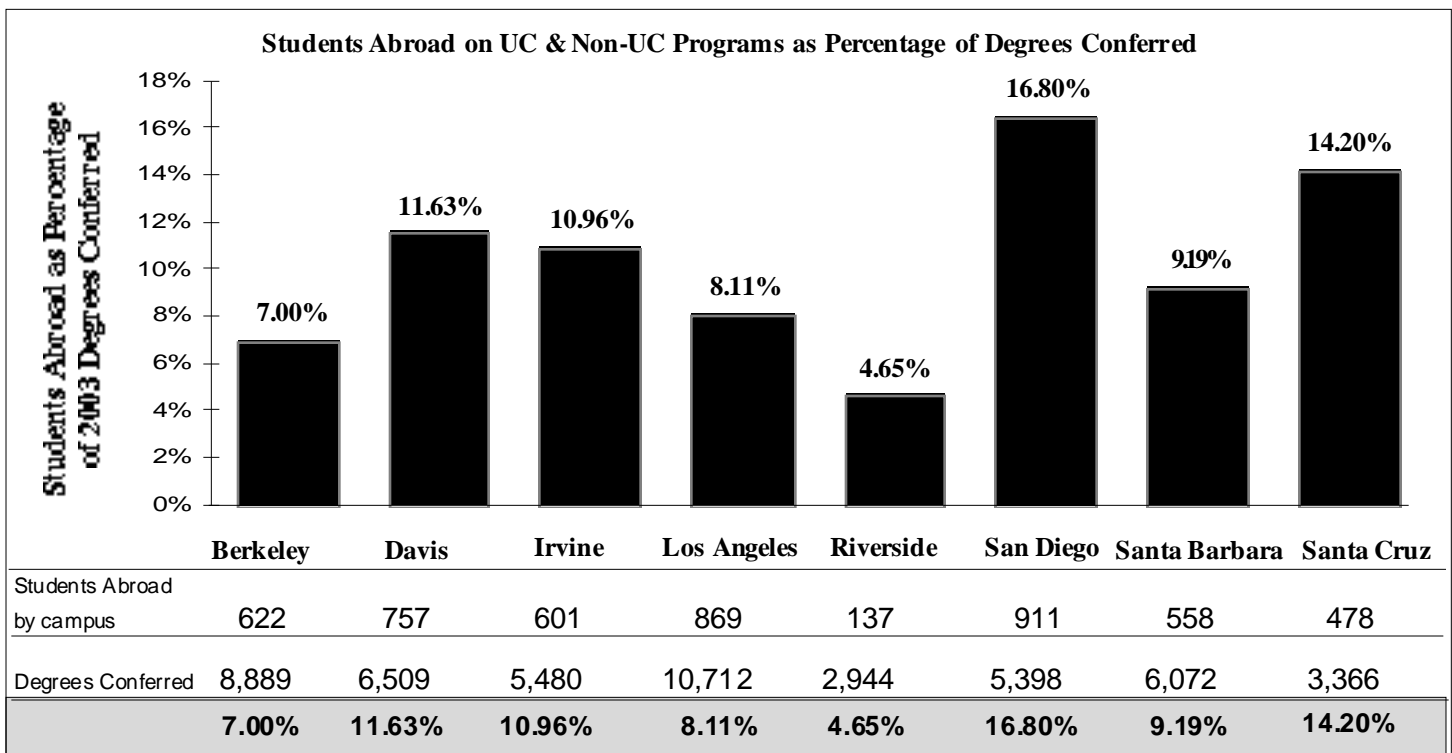
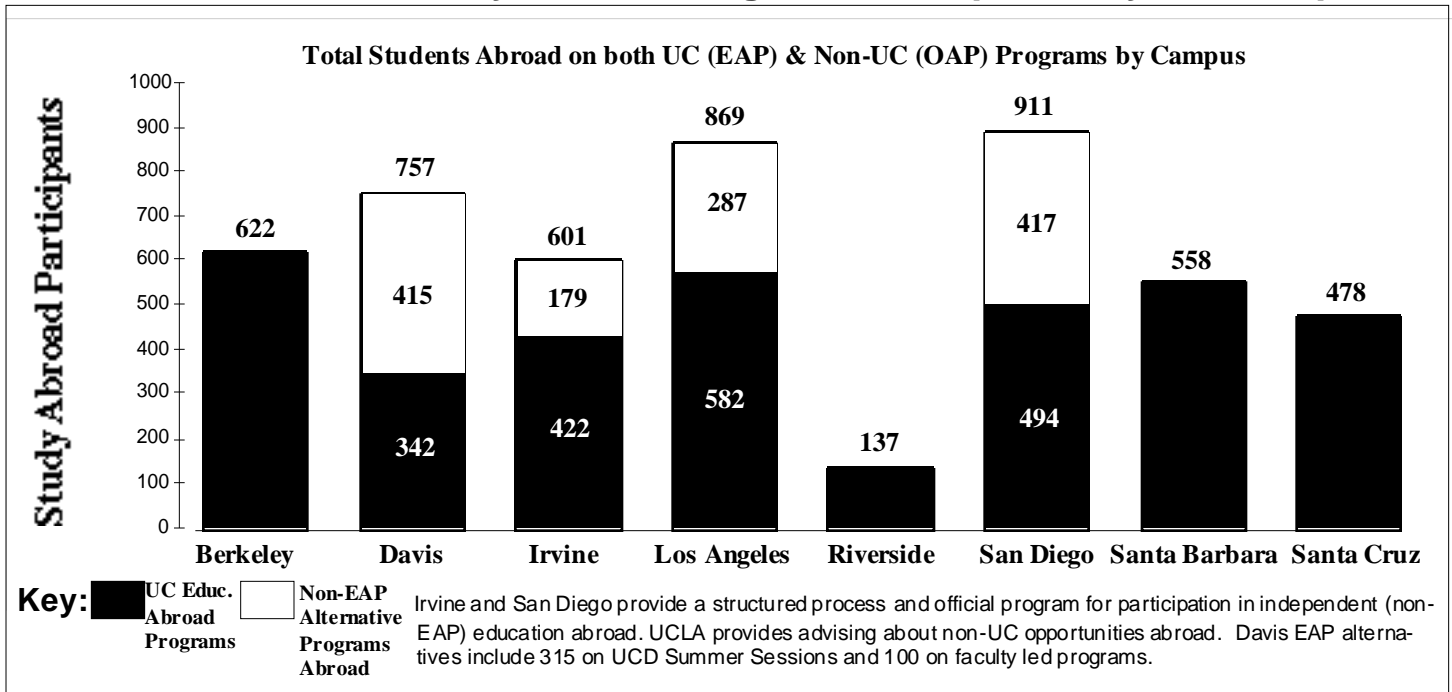

**ANNUAL REPORT
COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION
2002-03**

The Committee on International Education met quarterly during the 2002-2003 academic year. Issues that received most attention included: activities of the International Center; the International Studies major; University-wide efforts to integrate classes taken abroad into the curriculum; and the responsibilities of UCSD's Faculty Directors of International Education.

UCSD leads all other UC campuses in the number of students participating in study abroad programs, and ranks sixth among all U.S. research institutions in the number of international scholars present on campus. Participation in the Education Abroad Program (EAP) by UCSD students continues to increase steadily. As a result, workload has increased significantly while funding has not. This trend has been exacerbated by the requirements of the Patriot Act, under which the International Center, on behalf of UCSD, must report on all international students and scholars at UCSD. This is mainly done through SEVIS (Student and Exchange Visitor Information System), a database to which all major state and federal agencies have access. Federal agencies have also approached the Center directly on occasion for additional information about foreign students or researchers; the policy has been to supply only information now required by law. These requirements, as well as the intrusive and lengthy procedures required for some foreign nationals to secure visas, have raised the concern that international exchange of students and researchers may become restricted, especially in fields designated by the government as "critical" (examples include aerospace engineering, physics and life sciences).

The committee chair met with UCSB Professor Scott Cooper, who has been appointed as EAP Associate Director for Academic Integration. In the spring of 2003, shortly after his appointment, Professor Cooper visited all UC campuses as part of his effort to enhance integration of EAP into campus academic programs. The committee discussed these efforts and the role of UCSD Faculty Directors of International Education in promoting the benefits of such integration.

Professors Joe Esherick and Miles Kahler attended consecutive committee meetings in February and May to discuss details of UCSD's new International Studies Major. In spite of the fact that the major was established only in 2002, some 228 students had already interviewed for the major by May 2003, and 145 had officially declared the major. The major is interdisciplinary and involves a number of UCSD departments; students must also choose a regional area of specialization, and must complete a capstone seminar. Although course requirements are quite stringent, study abroad is encouraged and the major allows students to count up to six courses EAP courses taken abroad towards their major. The expectation is that the major will increase further UCSD students' participation in EAP.

Finally, at its third and final meeting of the year, the committee discussed and approved a proposal to restructure the organization of UCSD's Faculty Directors of Education Abroad. The proposed changes respond to the evolving role of international education on campus. They include reducing the number of Directors from four with equal responsibilities to two, a Director and an Associate Director, each with well-defined and somewhat different responsibilities, and to have the Director and Associate Director report directly to the Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. These changes were subsequently approved by the University administration.

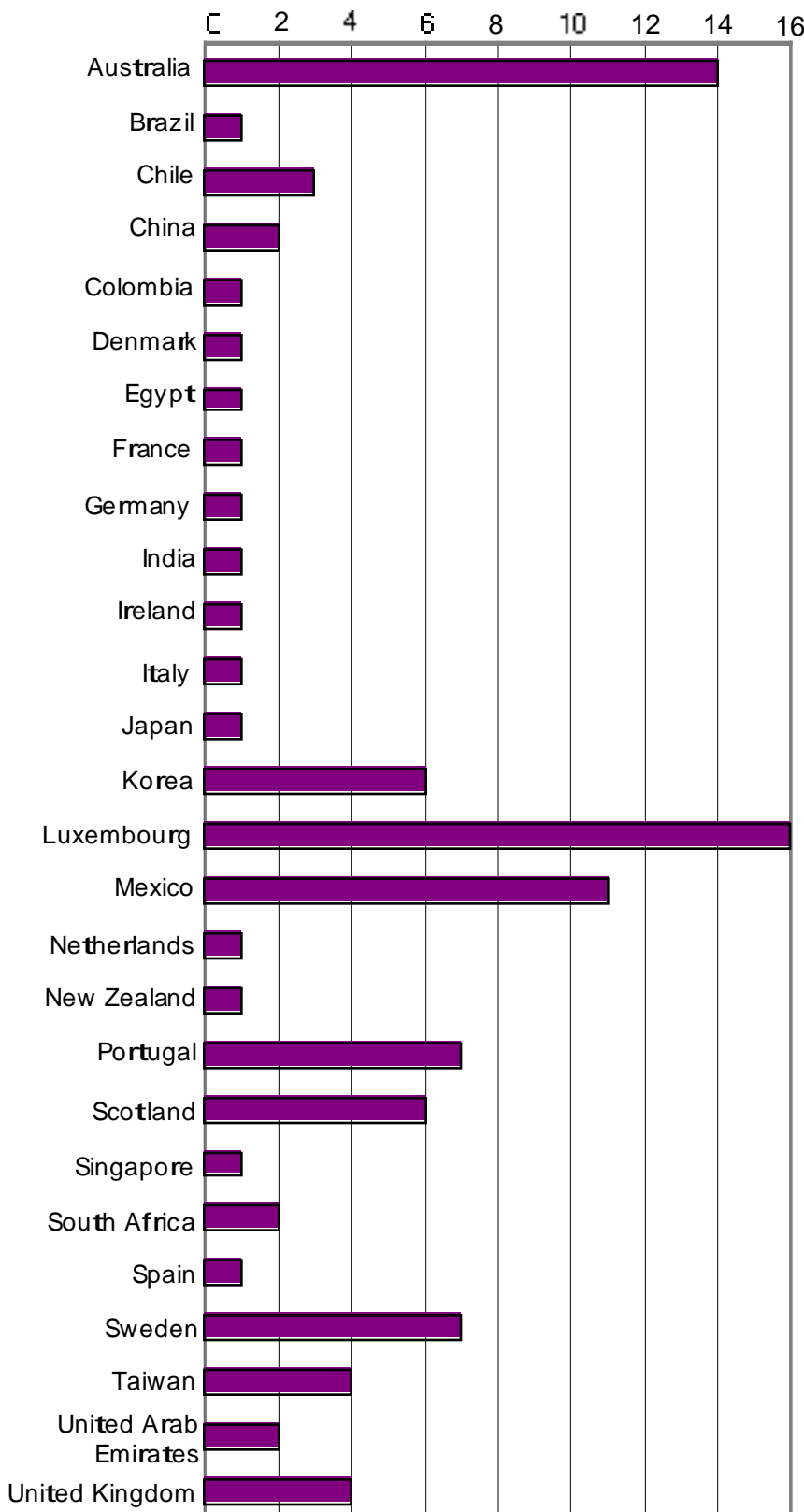

2002-2003 International House Residents Profile

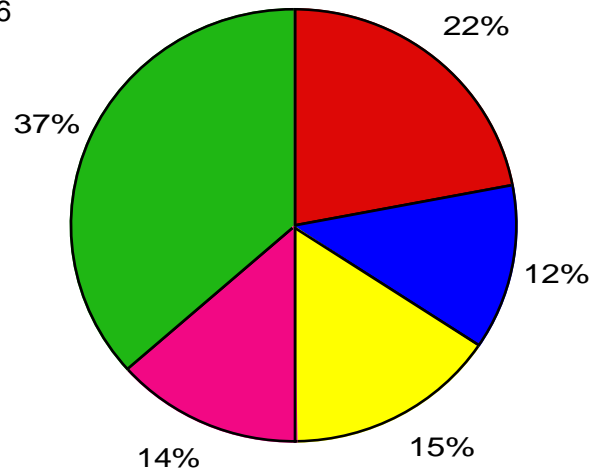
BY COUNTRY OUTSIDE OF THE U.S.

of Residents



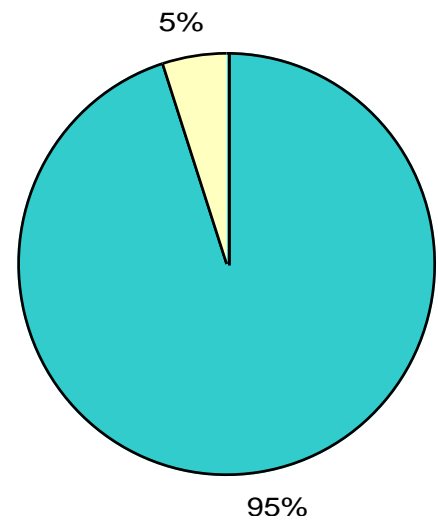
2002-2003 DISTRIBUTION BY COLLEGE
